

Assessment

Look inside your walls

- + Assess facility
- + Determine patron interest

Look outside your walls

+ Community mapping



Site Considerations

- + ADA accessible
- + Bright lighting
- + Comfortable seating
- + Clear sightlines
- + Climate controlled
- + Partner with another organization if needed



Artform Considerations

Visual Arts

- + Storage space
- + Table and chairs
- + Water source (if needed)

Literary Arts

+ Tables and chairs

Performing Arts

- + **Dance:** Large and supportive dance surface (no concrete) & chairs accessible
- + **Music:** Chairs and music stands
- + **Theater:** Large enough space for movement


